### **Russian World Ward II Database Grows**



The new Russian portal database <u>Pamiat' Naroda (Memory of the People) 1941-1945</u> brings together in one multiple World War II databases for the former Soviet Union. The portal provides access to more than 20 million records, with

indexes and digital images, including service records, military awards, casualties and missing in action lists, gravesites, records of units, and maps of combat operations. # FamilySearch Opens Access to Millions of Ukrainian Records

FamilySearch announced on May 30th that its collection of Ukrainian records, including millions of birth, marriage, and death records as well as censuses and more, are now available to be accessed at home. Previously, these were available only in family history centers. Like the millions of Russian records that were made accessible at home last year, access requires free registration to FamilySearch.org. ### Poznań Project Indexes 19th Century Marriages



The <u>Poznań Project</u> is an online index to more than 1.6 million 19th century marriages from the former Posen province in Prusssia, now in Poland. The database was created by Maciej Glowiak and is coordinated by Lukasz Bielecki. The goal is to transcribe all of the marriage records from Greater Poland for the 19th century. The project welcomes donations and volunteer assistance to complete the database. The site also provides links to numerous other Polish record indexes online.
