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

## **Ukrainian Records Online**



For some time now, a Ukrainian genealogist, Alex Krakovsky, has been digitizing records in Ukrainian archives, including Jewish metrical books and other vital records, school records, revision lists (poll tax censuses) and more. The focus is records of Jews, but these records also include non-Jews. Alex is a private citizen who is digitizing these records in archives himself, with the help of some donations. Many archives have tried to block him from doing so, but he has been successful in appealing to the courts for the right to digitize them, based on Ukrainian law that allows for public dissemination of this information.

Krakovsky has been posting these records on Wikimedia and linking them to the <u>Ukrainian language article about Jewish Shtetls</u> on Wikipedia. The Tsal Kaplun foundation has created a nice directory with links to these records by place, record type, and year. (See <u>Jewish Documents Kept by Ukrainian Archives</u>.) Krakovsky also posts links to his work in various places, including his Facebook page and the <u>Jewish Roots forum</u>. Not only will you be able to see your ancestors photos in living color, but you will also be able to better identify old mystery photos.


Learn from the experts in Slavic, Germanic, and other aspects of East European Genealogy.
